# The Coporation Museum.

To the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Colchester.

GENTLEMEN.

We beg to submit our Annual Report on the Corporation Museum for the year ended 31st March, 1911.

The number of visitors during the past year, though lower than the previous year, when the Pageant attracted so many persons to the town, may be favourably compared with previous records, and it is gratifying to think there is no diminution in the interest displayed in the Museum.

The number of additions to the various collections has again been large, and it is still a matter for great regret that more space cannot be obtained for their proper exhibition.

Owing to the kind response of a few friends of the Museum to an appeal for funds to provide new cases, three additional upright cases have been erected in the place of the old-fashioned desk case which occupied a large part of the centre floor space.

Two of these cases were given by the late Alderman Edwin J. Sanders, and Mr. W. W. Hewitt, of Lower Park, Dedham.

In these three cases are displayed the fine series of Red Glazed Gaulish Ware, commonly known as "Samian"; the Roman Glass Ware; and the beautiful Late-Celtic vessels found in Lexden Park and at Billericay, given respectively by Lady Grant Duff and Mrs. C. G. S. Reade.

This new arrangement has greatly improved the appearance of the Museum and has met with unqualified approval and admiration.

Three more cases of this type are much needed, and your Committee urgently appeal to those interested in the development of the Museum for further funds to complete the series.

Your Committee again desire to record their indebtedness to the large number of donors of many valuable and interesting gifts.

Foremost amongst these is the rare and valuable example of Tudor Wall Painting, found during the demolition of Hill House, North Hill, which was most generously presented to the Corporation by Mr. Thomas B. Parkington, of Ipswich. We understand that a large sum of money had been offered for the painting, but with true patriotic feeling Mr. Parkington decided that the proper home for this interesting relic of ancient Colchester was the Local Museum.

Mr. and Miss Daniell, of Heath House, West Bergholt, have given a large number of "Bygones," those interesting objects of old-fashioned life, comprising many articles of value which have been in the possession of their family for more than a century.

Mr. Alfred P. Wire, of Leytonstone, has given a volume of letters of John Brown, F.G.S., of Stanway. Mr. Wire has prefaced the volume by a life of the writer, which adds much to its interest and value.

Other additions of great local interest are the old Essex Cheese Press, given by Mr. Hastings Worrin, of Little Dunmow; the closely allied Cheese Room Label presented by Mr. Henry Fry, of Barnston Lodge, a relic of the days of the Window Tax; and a set of Moulds and Tools used in the extinct Colchester industry of Pipe-making, the gift of Mr. W. W. Scargill.

To Mr. J. F. Marlar we are indebted for an uninscribed Ancient British Gold Stater, dating from about 150 B.C., found in Colchester.

Amongst the many objects acquired by purchase, the most interesting and valuable are the Roman Inscription found in the grounds of the Royal Grammar School; a fine series of Casts of Corporate, Official and Ecclesiastical Seals of the County of Essex; and a volume of MSS. relating to Essex, which forms part of a series presented to the Corporation in 1871 by Mr. Robert Hills, of Colne Park.

In the ordinary work of the Museum much has been done by your Curator in the re-arrangement, cleaning, re-numbering and labelling of specimens, and your Committee desire to express their satisfaction with the activity displayed by the responsible officers in this department of the Council's work



The socket is choked up with fragments of bronze which suggests that this celt formed part of a hoard. A similar celt, now in the British Museum, was found at High Roding, Essex. See Evans, Ancient Bronze Implements, fig. 122.

Sepulchral Inscription in Purbeck marble. The slab in its present condition measures 14½ ins. × 18¾ ins., it has lost the upper portion. The inscription is in seven lines, and reads according to Professor Haverfield as follows, the "Deo Magno" formula is missing; the letters in square brackets are missing portions, or portions omitted by contraction.

Professor Haverfield remarks that "Eques Romanus" means "very roughly" Higher Civil Servant or member of the social class to which the Higher Civil Servants belong, it has nothing to do with Cavalry. Figurine of white clay, Venus, head and feet wanting. Height in present state 5\frac{1}{8}ins. Found on North Hill. Probably Gaulish, 1st century, A.D. Donor, Mr. J. F. Marlar.



The making of Cheese is a very ancient industry in Essex. Domesday Book shows that the Normans made huge cheeses from the milk of ewes grazed on the marshes round our coast, and this custom survived till the end of the Seventeenth Century. The numerous "wicks" round our coast mark the sites of the dairies in which these ewe-milk cheeses were made. From very early times, too, cheese has been made from the milk of cows. For centuries, practically every manor-house and farmhouse throughout the County had its "cheese loft" or "cheese room" for storing the cheeses made by and for the use of its inhabitants. The industry continued common in Essex till about the end of the Eighteenth Century, when it died out—apparently because it was found that the use of the milk for fattening calves for the London market yielded a better return. To-day, scarcely a memory of the old industry lingers in the County. See Mr. Miller Christy's article on the Industries of Essex in the Victoria County History, Essex, Vol. II.

The Act of Parliament, 48 George III., Ch. 55 (passed June 1st, 1808), imposed a tax, on a certain scale, on all windows of dwelling houses, but Section 13 thereof exempted from taxation the windows of all dairies and cheese rooms, provided such rooms were used solely for the purpose indicated, \* \* \* and that the owner painted or caused to be painted on the outer door thereof \* \* \* in large Roman letters, the words Dairy or Cheese Room as the case required. This Act was repealed in 1851.





### The Corporation Museum.

To the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Colchester.

GENTLEMEN,

We beg to submit our Annual Report on the Corporation Museum for the year ended 31st March, 1912.

The interest taken in the Museum shows no sign of decrease. During the past year, which terminated on 31st March, the Museum has been visited by 27,298 persons.

Your Committee gratefully acknowledge their indebtedness to a large number of donors of many valuable and interesting gifts, which are recorded in the accompanying lists.

Mr. T. B. and Miss Daniell, of Heath House, West Bergholt, have again presented a large number of "Bygones" to be included in the collection they gave last year.

Mr. Daniell has also added to the Coin Collection a fine example, in mint state, of the Five-Pound Piece of the Jubilee of Queen Victoria, 1887.

The Collection of Manuscripts has been enriched by the gift of Mr. Charles E. Benham, of a MS. Index to the volumes of Colchester Graveyard Inscriptions, compiled by the late Mr. Charles Golding, and a volume of Morant MSS., presented by the Rev. G. T. Bromwich, of Gestingthorpe.

Other additions of local interest are a fine Late-Celtic Pot, given by the Rev. J. W. Kenworthy, to be included in the collection of Braintree antiquities presented by him in 1910; two rare Perforated Stone Axes, found and given by Mr. Herbert Norfolk, of Manor Farm, Layer Breton, and two Carved Oak Beams from an old house on Hythe Hill, the gift of Mr. R. Beaumont, of Lexden.

Amongst the objects acquired by purchase, the most important are a Bronze Founder's Hoard, consisting of fifteen Socketed Bronze Celts, found near Dovercourt; a Silk and Velvet Weaver's Loom, from Coggeshall; and a pair of Silver-plated Cock Spurs, used in Cock Fighting, in the early part of last century.

It is a matter for congratulation that most of the old and obsolete Exhibition Cases in the Museum have now been replaced by those of more modern and up-to-date style and design. It was unanimously resolved at a meeting of your Committee last April to utilize a portion of the bequest to the Museum of the late Mrs. Susannah F. Boby, to defray the cost of the new cases required, and their installation was at once proceeded with.

Your Committee are also indebted to the liberality of Mr. and Miss Daniell who have given the case which contain their collection of "Bygones" and to the generosity of Mr. W. W. Hewitt, of Lower Park, Dedham, who has again come to their assistance with the gift of two wall cases to replace those in the south east window recess. They will be erected very shortly.

. The erection of the new cases has necessitated a considerable amount of re-arrangement, cleaning and labelling, and much remains to be done, but the result will be a more

effective and systematic display of the objects, which will largely increase their educational value.

The need of more accommodation for exhibition purposes, to which attention has been called in the reports of preceding years, has now become acute, and if the Colchester Museum is to continue to fulfil its purpose and retain a foremost place amongst other museums of the country, the settlement of a matter so important cannot be longer delayed.

The Committee has under its care a large collection of objects of great interest and educational value which are either not exhibited for want of space or are so cramped in their display that the value of the exhibition is thereby minimised.

Serious attention is now being bestowed upon this question, and your Committee hope to be able to place a report before the Council at an early date.

Your Committee invite the members of the Council and general public to visit the Museum and inspect the past year's work, and they desire to express their gratification at the activity displayed by the responsible officers of the department.



Food Vessel, or Cooking Pot, of coarse buff ware, unornamented. The pot was distorted and cracked in the firing, and was perforated in ancient times for repair with a cord or thong. Partly restored. Height 5\frac{5}{8}\text{ins.} Found near Shoebury. Late Bronze Age. Purchased. (Plate II.)

The Hon. John Abercromby, F.S.A. (Scot.) has kindly drawn attention to several Bronze Age pots recorded and illustrated by Thurnam, *Archæologia*, vol. xliii., pl. xxix., figs. 8 and 9; pl. xxx., fig. 7, which have similar "reparation holes" drilled in their sides.

M. Paul du Chatellier also figures an example of late Stone Age date (Epoque de la Pierre Polie) in his La Poterie \* \* \* en Armorique, pl. 7, fig. 11.

### EARLY IRON AGE (LATE-CELTIC).

- Fragment of a shallow Dish, or Tazza, of Kimmeridge Shale with beaded rim. Late Celtic. Donor, Mr. Philip G. Laver, F.S.A.
- Large Bronze Hook, beautifully wrought in flat bronze, with ring for suspension formed of stout bronze wire, the ends overlapping in spiral coils. Length 3¼ins. Late-Celtic?

Neck of a large Amphora, with one handle, of fine buff ware, belonging to the tall slender type generally found with Late-Celtic remains. Early 1st century, A.D. Donor, Mr. A. G. Wheeler

# The Corporation Museum.

To the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Colchester.

GENTLEMEN,

We beg to submit our Annual Report on the Corporation Museum for the year ended 31st March, 1913.

The number of visitors to the Museum during the past year has exceeded all expectations, amounting as it does to 32,149, the highest number yet recorded with the exception of the Pageant Year. This is the more gratifying, because there has been a slight annual decrease since 1907, with a considerable drop in 1911.

It is pleasing to think that this renewal of interest in the Museum is due to the installation of new cases affording a better arrangement and display of the collections than hitherto.

During the summer, the two wall cases given by Mr. W. W. Hewitt, of Lower Park, Dedham, were erected on the bases of the old cases they replaced in the S.E. window recess. One of these has been allotted to the Taylor Collection of Romano-British Burial Groups from West Lodge, and the other to various antiquities of the same period.

Mr. Philip G. Laver has kindly given a set of sliding trays to contain the collection of "Samian" fragments; these have been fitted to the cupboards under the "Samian" case.

The accessions of the year have again been numerous, and your Committee desire to thank the many donors of valuable and interesting gifts which are recorded in the accompanying lists.

The most notable of these are a Cinerary Urn of the Bronze Age, found at Mistley, near Manningtree, given by Mr. W. B. Nichols, J.P., of Stour Lodge, Bradfield; a group of Late-Celtic vessels from Heybridge, given by the Heybridge Parish Council; a fine Pedestalled Urn, of the same period found at Rayleigh, from Mr. E. B. Francis, of Rayleigh; and a Bowl of unusual form, and a Pedestalled Vase from Lexden, given respectively by Mr. Vernon E. Marshall and Mr. Philip G. Laver, F.S.A.

Mrs. E. J. Sanders has further enriched the Late-Celtic Collection for which the Museum is justly renowned, by the gift of a fine Amphora of a type usually associated with remains of that period, found in her garden at Lexden Park.

A remarkably fine ornamented Vase of Belgic Ware, found in Colchester some years ago, has been presented by Mrs. Richardson, of Brighton, through Alderman Wilson Marriage; a Romano-British Burial Group from Lexden is the gift of Mr. Mervyn Goody; and for a Burial Group of the same period, found at Heybridge, the Museum is indebted to Mr. Ernest Lewis, of that town.

During the summer, the Great Barrow at West Mersea was excavated by Mr. S. Hazzledine Warren, F.G.S., for the Morant Club, and in a Tile Tomb was found a remarkable burial, consisting of a fine Glass Bowl, containing the burnt remains, which was enclosed in a Leaden Box covered by two pieces of oak board. By an agreement with the Morant Club, these have been presented to the Museum by Mr. Charles Brown, the owner of the Barrow, and form one of the most interesting exhibits of the Romano-British period.

The antiquities of a later date include a fine Anchor of the Tudor period, given by Captain Sycamore and Mr. Albert A. Jefferies, of Brightlingsea; an ornamented Box-head Pump from Mr. William Simpson, of Woodford Green; a hide covered Travelling Trunk, early 18th Century, from Mr. Thomas B. Daniell, of West Bergholt; and a Barley Awner, an obsolete agricultural implement, from the Hon. Curator, Alderman Henry Laver, F.S.A.

Two valuable and interesting additions to the MSS. Collection are a volume of Morant MS., the gift of Alderman Gurney Benham, J.P., and a volume of Sepia Drawings of Colchester and neighbourhood, made by Major-General James Cockburn, R.A., about 1815, from Mr. Charles J. Bendon, of Latton.

A large number of interesting accessions have also been made by purchase.

The question of an Annexe for the proper exhibition of the large amount of valuable material at present packed away for want of exhibition space and cases in the present Museum, has seriously occupied the attention of your Committee during

the past year, and a scheme is under consideration whereby the premises formerly occupied by the Albert School of Art may be acquired for the purpose.

Such an Annexe would, we are sure, be extremely popular. A number of interesting gifts have already been received, and many more, we are convinced, would be forthcoming, if it were known that such would in due course be properly housed and exhibited.

Your Committee are already indebted to the Trustees of the British Museum for three cases of Electrotypes of British Historical Medals; to Mrs. C.Hilton-Price for a series of Mummied Remains from Egypt; to Mr. W. A. G. Taylor, for two fine cases of rare British Birds, including an Osprey and Eagle Owl; and to Mr. W. W. Pittock, for examples of Ancient Peruvian Pottery.

A considerable amount of cleaning, mounting, labelling, numbering and re-arranging of specimens has been accomplished and a number of accessions in the pottery collections have been repaired and restored by your Curator during the year.

Many of the most important accessions have been photographed by the Curator, including those illustrated in this Report.

Your Committee invite the members of the Council and general public to visit the Museum and inspect the past year's work, and they feel convinced the Council will appreciate the interest and activity displayed by the responsible officers of the department.

# List of Additions to the Museum

#### STONE AND BRONZE AGES.

Half of a Cooking Pot of yellow brown paste with admixture of white quartz particles; with three lugs perforated horizontally for cord for suspension or carrying. Restored from the fragments found near the Hoard of Socketed Celts at Dovercourt, 1911. (See Annual Report 1911–12, p. 8, pl. I.B.) Height 5% ins. Late Bronze Age. Purchased, 2479.12

Cast of the pointed end of what was probably a Wooden Spear, the original of which was found by the donor in the *Elephas Antiquus* bed at Clacton-on-Sea. Palæolithic. Donor, Mr. S. Hazzledine Warren, F.G.S. 2517.12

Casts of four Flint Implements the originals of which were found by the donor in the *Elephas Antiquus* bed at Clactonon-Sea, Palæolithic. Donor, Mr. S. Hazzledine Warren, F.G.S. 2517.12

Mr. Warren has kindly contributed the following note:-The Elephas Antiquus bed of Clacton-on-Sea contains worked flints which represent the waste product of a working-site. The deposit itself was formed by the silting up of the bed of a stream, and the flint-working must have been executed upon the banks of the stream in the immediate vicinity, as the implements are quite unrolled. The greater number of the implements are exceedingly rude and difficult to date because they do not accord as a series with any of the recognised Palæolithic culture stages. A few might be described as pseudo-Chellean in form, some are pseudo-Mousterian, while a much greater number are pseudo-Neolithic. The most probable explanation of this seems to be that it is the waste product of a flint-working industry and that the majority of the finished implements were carried away and used elsewhere. Besides flakes, cores and a few scrapers, the most characteristic implements of the site are rude side choppers, examples of which are shown in the casts. They have no resemblance to the Mousterian side-scrapers, the "racloirs" of the French prehistorians. The purpose of these tools is very obscure. They are sometimes found among series of Chellean date, but are generally most abundant among the surface implements of the Chalk downs of the South of England. Thus the Clacton bed has not so far furnished any series that is definitely characteristic of any one epoch. The associated fauna clearly defines it as Palæolithic, while the physical position of the Clacton bed in the general succession of the river deposits would appear to suggest a date later than the Mousterian epoch. But this involves the controversial question of the range in time of Elephas antiquus; it is therefore wiser to leave the date an open question.

The pointed shaft of wood, which appears to be the broken end of a spear, is of much interest, as Palæplithic wood-work is of great rarity. There can be no doubt that prehistoric man used weapons of wood very largely, but it is only in such deposits as the Clacton bed which contains much wood that there is any possibility of their being preserved. See S. Hazzledine Warren, Quart. Journal. Geol. Society, Vol. LXVII. 1911; Proceedings, page XCIX.; The Essex

Fabricator of chipped black flint, the ends rounded and polished by use. Length 3 flins. Found on shore of creek at Goldhanger by donor. Neolithic. Donor, Mr. Charles Marsh.

Cinerary Urn (Abercromby, type I), of coarse red brown ware, with overhanging rim ornamented with alternate groups of horizontal and vertical lines formed by the impression before baking of a twisted cord. Slightly restored. Height 13½ ins. Found in an inverted position over the burnt remains of an adult at Mistley, near Manningtree. Late Bronze Age, about 700-600, B.C. Donor, Mr. W. B. Nichols, J.P. (Plate I.)

This form seems to be rather later than those of the same type found at Alphamstone, Essex, which have the *caretto* moulding below the overhanging rim. See *Annual Reports*, 1905–6, page 16, plate 1; 1906-7, page 7, plate 2; 1908-9, page 9, plate 1; also "The Relative Chronology of some Cinerary Urn Types," by the Hon. John Abercromby, F.S.A. (Scot.), in *Proc. Society of Antiquaries of Scotland*, vol. XLI.

Ovate Implement of well-chipped cherty brown flint, of Palæolithic type. Length 4ins., breadth, 3\frac{1}{8}ins. (Fitch Coll.) Probably found near Maldon. Purchased. 2669 13

Several Sherds of Late Bronze and Early Iron Age pottery, with three flint flakes from Hamborough Hill, near Rayleigh, found by donor. Donor, Mr. H. Rand. 2685.13


### EARLY IRON AGE (LATE CELTIC).

Large Cinerary Pot of brown ware, with shallow cordon on shoulder; the exterior polished except for a dul band 3\frac{3}{4} ins. wide below bulge. Height, 9\frac{5}{8} ins. Found on site of new cemetery, Heybridge. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Donors, The Heybridge Parish Council. (Plate II.) 2470.12

A similar Pot was found in the Aylesford Late-Celtic Urnfield. See Archæologia, vol. LVII., pl. VII. fig. 2.

Cinerary Pot of brown ware with three cordons on shoulder; the exterior which shows traces of a black glaze is polished except for a dull band 13 ins. wide below bulge. Height 74 ins. Found on site of new cemetery, Heybridge. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Donors, The Heybridge Parish Council. (Plate II.)

A similar Pot is in the Spitty Collection and another example was found at Little Hallingbury. See *Annual Report*, 1908–9, p. 10, pl. III., fig. 6 and pl. X. fig. 1. Also *Trans. Essex Arch. Society*, vol. IX., p. 348, plate, fig 1.

Shallow Tazza of hard grey ware with pedestalled foot and two cordons below brim; the exterior is highly polished and shows traces of having been covered with a black glaze or pigment. Restored. Height, 4\frac{3}{8}ins.; diameter across brim, 10\frac{3}{8}ins. Found on site of new cemetery, Heybridge. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Donors, The Heybridge Parish Council. (Plate II.) 2472.12

This Tazza probably formed a lid to a similar bowl forming a double vessel like that in the same case found at Colchester. See Annual Report, 1905-6, pp. 14-15, plates 2 and 3. An example of these double vessels, the upper of which more closely resembles that from Heybridge, is figured in the British Museum, Guide to the Antiquities of the Early Iron Age, page 25, fig. 21.

Several Sherds of Late-Celtic wares, including base of a pedestalled urn, portion of a moulded beaker or pedestalled bowl and of a shallow tazza, similar to No. 2472.12. Found on site of new cemetery, Heybridge. Donors, the Heybridge Parish Council.

Base fragment of a Large Platter of glazed red ware, probably 20ins. in diameter when perfect. It is provided with a low broad foot-ring and the interior is ornamented with a rouletted circle within which are four potters' stamps of rectangular form, all more or less undecipherable. Found on site of new cemetery, Heybridge. Donors, the Heybridge Parish Council.

- Fragment of polished brown ware, with a matt band on which is a tooled scroll ornament. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, A.D. Donor, Mr. Philip G. Laver, F.S.A. 2532.12
- Upper Stone of Quern of Hertfordshire Conglomerate, locally known as Pudding Stone. Diameter, 9% ins., depth, 3½ ins. Found at Great Yeldham. Late-Celtic. Donor, Mr. H. W. L. Way. 2586.12
- Large Vase or Beaker of polished brown ware, with pedestalled base; the outward sloping sides terminating in a beaded brim. Height, 6\frac{3}{4}\text{ins.}; diameter at mouth, 8\frac{1}{2}\text{ins.} Found on site of donor's house in Lexden Park. Late-Celtic, 1st Century. B.C. Donor, Mr. Vernon E. Marshall. (Plate VI.-2)
- Pedestalled Vase of polished brown ware showing traces of a black varnish or pigment, which originally covered the exterior surface. The under part of the base is carefully turned and slightly dished. Partly restored. Height, 8½ins. Found at Lexden. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Donor, Mr. Philip G. Laver, F.S.A. (Plate V.-1.) 2623.12

A similar Vase was found at Welwyn. See Archwologia, Vol. LXIII., pl. III. fig. 9.


Pedestalled Vase of greyish brown ware, with traces of a black varnish or pigment which originally covered the exterior; on the shoulder are traces of diagonally tooled lines below which are two slight cordons; the rim is wanting. The under base is carefully finished with a circular cordon round a raised centre. Partly restored. Present height, 13\frac{2}{4}\text{ins.} Found at Hamborough Hill, near Rayleigh, Essex. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. (Plate III.) Donor, Mr. E. B. Francis.

This remarkably fine vessel when perfect must have closely resembled that from Colchester in the General Collection, No. 638.04, and was similar to the Aylesford example, Evans, type 6. See Archæologia, vol. LII., pl. VII., fig 6. The Hamborough Hill vessel was found with eight others, placed in a straight line. Two of these have been acquired by the Museum, Nos. 2665 and 2666.13; the rest were unfortunately destroyed. See Essex Naturalist, Vol. XVI., pp. 252-254.



- Pedestalled Vase of brown ware with traces of a black glaze or pigment, with slightly everted beaded rim. The exterior has been carefully tooled or polished except for a broad band round centre; the under base is carefully finished and slightly dished. Partly restored. Height, 13\frac{3}{4}\text{ins.} Found at Hamborough Hill, near Rayleigh. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Purchased. (Plate III.) 2665.13
- Barrel-shaped Vase of polished brown ware with roughly executed cordons below a slightly concave brim and round centre. The under base, which is rather worn, was carefully finished and shows traces of a circular groove near the edge. Partly restored. Height, 8½ ins. Found at Hamborough Hill, near Rayleigh. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Purchased. (Plate III.)
- Mouth of an Amphora of buff ware with broad flat brim on which are impressed two square stamps PE and what appear to be the letters IMT roughly painted in some black pigment. Found at Heybridge near Maldon. (Fitch Coll.). Purchased.
- Amphora of buff ware of cylindric form (Lœschcke, type 70), with broad flat brim and single-grooved handles; the point at base wanting. Partly restored. Present height, 29ins. Found in donor's garden at Lexden Park House. Late-Celtic. Donor, Mrs. E. J. Sanders. (Plate IV.) 2680.13

Similar Amphoræ were found at Welwyn, Herts, in association with Late-Celtic pottery and Fire-dogs, see Archæologia, Vol. LXIII., p. 4, fig. 2., and the remains of a similar Amphora of red ware were found with Pedestalled Urns in Lexden Park, 1909. This type also occurred at Haltern in Westphalia, a Roman camp of the Augustan period occupied between B.C. II and A.D. 9. See Læschcke. Mitteil: der Altertums-Kom: fur Westfalen. Vol. 1909, p. 256, pl. xxiii., 8.

Pedestalled Vase of dark brown ware, with polished exterior; slight cordon below everted brim and moulded underbase. Repaired and restored. Height, 123ins. Found at Lexden. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Purchased. (Plate V.-2.)

- Pedestalled Vase of brown ware, with traces of a black glaze or pigment which originally covered the exterior; deep neck set off from the shoulder by a slight groove; narrow cordon above base which is beaded underneath. Height, 9½ins. Found at Lexden. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Purchased. (Plate V.-3.)
- Pedestalled Vase, similar to No. 2720.13, Repaired and restored, Height, 9½ins. Found at Lexden. Late-Celtic, 1st Century. B.C. Purchased. (Plate V.-4.) 2721.13
- Carinated Bowl of polished brown ware with everted brim and moulding at base of incurved sides which are ornamented by two shallow cordons and girth grooves; the base has a shallow foot-ring within which is a tooled line with spiral in centre. Slightly restored. Height 315 ins. Found at Lexden. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Purchased. (Plate VI.-3.)
- Small Tazza-shaped lid of polished brown ware with traces of a black glaze covering exterior; the short pedestal-handle is beaded on upper surface. Slightly restored. Height, 2\frac{5}{8} ins. diameter, 5\frac{5}{8} ins. Found close to the Carinated Bowl, No. 2722.13, to which it probably belongs. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Purchased. (Plate VI.-3.) 2723.13
- Carinated Pot of globular form of polished brown ware with traces of black glaze or pigment; bead rim to mouth and small foot-ring on base. Partly restored. Height, 4¼ins. Found at Lexden. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Purchased. (Plate VI.-1.)
- Pedestalled Bowl, or Beaker, of polished brown ware with traces of black glaze; the sides are slightly incurved with everted brim, and shallow moulding above the pedestal which is slightly hollowed underneath. Partly restored. Found at Lexden. Late-Celtic, 1st Century, B.C. Purchased. (Plate VI.-4.)

#### ROMANO-BRITISH PERIOD.

Cinerary Pot of brownish-red ware with polished black exterior; beneath the everted rim a row of indented notches; slightly beaded base. Height, II¼ins. 

The upper portion is carefully polished, except a narrow band 13/4 ins. wide between double girth grooves, this is ornamented with tooled trellis pattern with two bands of meander pattern below. This type occurs at Novaesium (Neuss), the occupation of which is dated by Lehner A.D. 25-105. See Bonner Jahrbücher 111-112, pl. XXVI., 24-25. It was also found in the early pits at Newstead. See Curle, Roman Fort of Newstead, p. 198. It appears to have had a long life, probably from the middle of the 1st Century to about the close of the 2nd Century, A.D.



- Umbrella with patent fastening. Engraved on slide. Trade mark, a cat stalking a mouse; below, "E. Charagent, Patent Automator, March 22, 1875"; on either side "Paris" and "London." Donor, Mr. Rowland Taylor. 2546.12
- Twelve wrought iron Nails, probably 18th Century. Donor, Mr. F. List. 2547.12
- Iron Key formed by hammering a piece of flat metal to a hollow tube with plain band and circular bow. Found on site of the old Packet Inn, Hythe Hill. Donor, Mr. B. Lawrence. 2548.12
- Small Stone Font, found in a garden at Myland; probably Norman and belonged to an early Myland Church. Donor, Mr. Philip G. Laver, F.S.A. 2551.12
- Iron Padlock used by Revenue Officers. Early 19th Century.
  Donor, Mr. E. J. Wilton. 2561.12
- Small Spherical Bell (Grelot) of bronze, ornamented with lions' heads in relief after the style of those on Venetian wine glass stems of the 17th Century. Found in donor's garden. Donor, Mr. F. C. H. Nunn. 2568.12
- Pair of Shoes worn by boys of the Blue Coat School, Colchester.

  This pair was used by Mr. Frank Daniell when painting his picture of the Blue Coat Boy now in the Town Hall.

- Brass Dress Suspender, stamped "Ffyfe's Patent, Registered, September 21, 1876." Purchased. 2593.12

- Pair of Steel Snuffers. Purchased.

- Barley Awner, for removing the awns or beard from barley. A cylindrical roller formed by three circular plates of iron set with thin iron bars, with socket for wooden handle. Donor, the Hon. Curator, Alderman Henry Laver, F.S.A. 2600.12
- Small Mortar in bell metal, Height, 3\subsections. Probably 18th Century. Donor, the Hon. Curator, Alderman H. Laver, F.S.A. 2605.12
- Iron Anchor of Dutch or Spanish origin; the shank, which is provided with a large iron ring, is II feet in length; the stock and one fluke are wanting. The anchor was dredged up from the Wallett, about 3½ miles from Clacton, where it had been an impediment to Trawlers for generations. Probably early 16th Century. Donors, Captain Edward Sycamore and Mr. Albert A. Jefferies. 2625.12
- Old Pewter Button bearing the inscription ESEX in relief; probably from uniform of Militia of late 17th or early 18th Century. Donor, Mr. Philip G. Laver, F.S.A. 2626.12
- Piece of Carved Walnut wood, the geometric pattern of which has been inlaid with a lighter wood (? Olive) affixed by small brass pins. Found in an old house in Baker's Row, Magdalen Street. Probably Italian work of 17th Century. Purchased.

## The Corporation Museum.

To the Mayor and Council of the Borough of Colchester.

Gentlemen,

We beg to submit our Annual Report on the Corporation Museum for the year ended 31st March, 1914.

The interest taken in the Museum is well maintained. During the past year the number of visitors has reached the gratifying total of 29,564.

The diminution as compared with the previous year is largely due to the fact that two Easter holidays fell in the twelve months ending March 31st, 1913.

Your Committee are again indebted to a large number of donors for many valuable and interesting additions to the various collections, and these have been supplemented by several purchases. A few friends of the Museum have also deposited various objects of interest.

All these are recorded in detail in the accompanying lists, and some of the most important are illustrated from photographs taken specially for this Report by the Curator.

The work of the Museum has steadily proceeded during the past year, and much has been done in the way of cleaning, restoring, labelling and numbering in oil paint a large number of specimens.

A considerable improvement has been effected in the Upper Room. The Bronze and Iron Ages case has been coloured a neutral green, and the Pottery, Implements and Weapons arranged in chronological order. The "Jarmin Collection" case has also been coloured a suitable shade of green and the collection rearranged.

The case of Mediæval and Later Pottery is now in process of recolouring and re-arrangement.

The need of more accommodation for Exhibition purposes, to which attention has been so frequently called, grows more acute every year, and it is to be hoped that the efforts being made by your Committee for the Establishment in the Albert School buildings of an Educational Museum and Art Gallery will meet with success.

Several valuable gifts have already been received and promises of others when this Museum is started.

The event of the year has been the excavation of the Balkern Gate by the Morant Club, under the supervision of Mr. Ernest Mason. The excavations have been visited by many of the leading Archæologists of the country, who have expressed the opinion that the Gate was one of the largest and finest in Britain, the frontage being over a hundred feet in length with double carriage and foot ways, with guard room at either end.

At the January meeting of your Committee it was unanimously resolved to ask the Council to sanction a scheme for covering over the remains of the Gateway to ensure their preservation and afford facilities to the public to view.

The Ordnance Survey Sheets of the Borough on a suitable scale have been purchased on which it is proposed to indicate all ancient remains which exist or have been, or may be, found.

Your Committee invite the members of the Council and general public to visit the Museum and inspect the past year's work and accessions, and they feel convinced the Council will appreciate the interest and activity displayed by the responsible officers of the department.



# List of Additions to the Museum

BY GIFT AND PURCHASE.

All the objects were found in Colchester, unless otherwise stated.

#### STONE AND BRONZE AGES.

Perforated Hammer Head, made from an ovoid sandstone or quartzite pebble, 25 ins. × 25 ins. Found at Parson's Heath, 1913. Late Neolithic or Early Bronze Age. (*Plate, I.-2.*) Purchased. 2798.13

See Evans, Stone Implements of Great Britain, p. 228, et seq.

- Polished Axe of grey flint. Length, 6ins. Found at Gore Pit, Kelvedon. Late Neolithic. (*Plate, I*.·I.) Donor, Mr. N. Sherwood. 2882.13
- Beaker (Abercromby, type B.), of thin red-brown ware, ornamented with parallel grooves with fringed edges. Partly restored. Height, 4½ins. Found at West Mersea. Bronze Age, about 1800 B.C. Donor, Mr. Ashton Turner. (Plate, II.-2.)

"Vessels of this class are hand-made, usually from 6 to 9 in. high, with thin walls made of clay tempered with sand or finely pounded stone. The surface of the vessel has often a polished appearance from being smoothed and rubbed with a stone or piece of bone. The vessels were fairly well baked in an open fire . . . . This class of pottery is found almost invariably with skeleton interments under barrows, though a few instances have been noted where there was no indication that a tumulus had ever existed." The Hon. John Abercromby, A Study of the Bronze Age Pottery of Great Britain and Ireland, vol. 1, p. 17.

Small Bowl or Food Vessel of coarse dark brown ware with plain sloping sides. Partly restored. Height, 2\frac{1}{2}ins. Found at Shoebury. Bronze Age. (Plate III.-I.) Purchased.

Food Vessel (Abercromby, type 4), of coarse brownish-drab ware, with smooth exterior. Height, 34 ins. Found at Great Wakering, Essex. Bronze Age. (Plate, 11.-1.)
Purchased.

The Hon. John Abercromby writing of this class of vessels says they "served the same purpose as the beakers and were evidently placed in the grave for the use of the deceased; in some of them bones of small animals or the remains of decayed animal and vegetable matter have been observed. Compared with beakers, the walls of the vessels are thicker, more solid, and though generally of small size (from 4 to 6 inches in height) are heavier than a beaker of greater height. The forms are quite different and none can be derived from it." Bronze Age Pottery of Great Britain and Ireland, vol. 1, p. 93.

### EARLY IRON AGE (LATE-CELTIC).

Wooden Bowl with convex sides and beaded base, brim wanting; much corroded and cracked. Present height 23ins., diameter 43ins.? Donor, Mr. Philip G. Laver, F.S.A. 2759.13

The form resembles that of the wooden bowl found in the Glastonbury Lake Village. See *British Museum Guide to Antiquities of the Early Iron Age*, page 126, fig. 107.

A similiar pot is in the "Spitty Collection" of Late-Celtic pottery found at Billericay.

#### ROMANO-BRITISH PERIOD.

Fragment of "Samian" Bowl (form 37), with Panel decoration. Silenus with flute, as D. 311, panels divided by zig-zag lines terminating in rosettes. Lezoux ware. Fragment of "Samian" Bowl (Form 37), with free figure decoration, Dog chasing Boar to r., ring and dot ornament above, herbage and birds below; characteristic of the work of Reginus. 


